



Princely splendour in Vienna

The Liechtenstein Princely Family, the owner of LGT, is one of the oldest Austrian noble families in Europe. The name Liechtenstein first emerged around 1136. Hugo von Liechtenstein was thought to have taken his name from Liechtenstein Castle, south of Vienna, as early as 1140. As a result of Prince Karl I's (1569–1627) links to the Holy Roman Empire through his hereditary title of Prince of the Holy Roman Empire gained in 1608, the Family has a close relationship with Austria, and with Vienna in particular. The Family's passion for art and architecture can be experienced in Vienna in very inspiring ways, such as visiting the Princely Collections at one of the Family's palaces.

Liechtenstein Garden Palace

The Liechtenstein Garden Palace in Vienna's Rossau district was built in 1700 by Prince Johann Adam Andreas I of Liechtenstein and is owned by the Princely Family of Liechtenstein. Its Baroque rooms, splendid interiors and large garden area are truly impressive.

The heart of the Garden Palace is the art collection of the Princes of Liechtenstein. The Princely Collections are one of the most important private collections in the world. They include masterpieces from the early Renaissance to the High Baroque by artists such as Peter Paul Rubens, Rembrandt, Van Dyck, and Raphael, among others.

The Golden Carriage

The Golden Carriage is one of the finest examples of 18th-century Parisian coach craftsmanship and is one of the few to survive the turmoil of the French Revolution. It was used by Prince Joseph Wenzel I von Liechtenstein.

The Golden Carriage is a berline de suite, one of the most modern and elegant types of carriage of its time, distinguished by its stability and comfort. The painted decorations were the work of the studio of François Boucher. Rather than the conventional depictions of a ruler's virtues, it features playful putti symbolising the four elements and the four seasons.



Hercules Hall

Hercules Hall is the palace's ballroom, with ceiling frescoes depicting the Greek hero's admittance to Olympus. The ceiling was completed between 1704 and 1708 and has been preserved to maintain its original Baroque colours.



Sala Terrena

The Sala Terrena is a three-storey hall that is suffused in light and adorned with white columns and open access to the palace's gardens. The centrepiece of the Sala Terrena is the Golden Carriage, one of the highlights of the Princely Collections.



The Princely Garden

Totalling roughly five hectares, the Princely Garden is a magnificent green oasis in Vienna's 9th District. When Prince Johann Adam Andreas I von Liechtenstein commissioned the Palace, he took inspiration for the garden from the lush imagery of classical Italian art, giving it a Mediterranean influence.

The garden is open during the day to visitors and locals, providing a serene space for relaxation amid beautiful flower beds.



Liechtenstein City Palace

The Liechtenstein City Palace is regarded as one of the earliest and most significant examples of High Baroque architecture in Vienna. Situated in the heart of Vienna, close to the Burgtheater and the Volksgarten in the Erster Wiener Bezirk (the 1st district of Vienna), the City Palace is another architectural jewel owned by the Princely Family of Liechtenstein.

The magnificent building, which re-opened in early 2013 after significant renovations, boasts the highest levels of perfection in architecture and interior design. Painstaking efforts were made to bring the Palace up to contemporary standards, while perfectly preserving its historic charm. It features Baroque stucco ceilings which fuse with opulent Rococo Revival interiors, original furniture, and exquisite parquet flooring by Michael Thonet to form a harmonious whole, revealing insights into the aristocratic life of bygone eras.

The Square Room

The Square Room, which is roughly 155m², is illuminated by an ornate chandelier and adjoins the Ballroom, connected by two double doors.



The Ballroom

Occupying 165m², the magnificent Ballroom with its huge chandeliers is the largest function room in the City Palace. The open arrangement of the corridors on the east and west sides of the hall and the adjoining south corridor creates a total area of 260m².



The Princely Dining Room

The 150m² Princely Dining Room serves as an exclusive extension of the first-floor rooms. Adorned with a 19th-century French carpet and original furniture, the Room features a grand dining table that can seat 28 guests.

The Concert Room

With its total area of 150m² and large window façade on two sides, the Concert Room is a well-lit function room that has been used for a wide range of occasions over the centuries.

Staircase

The Liechtenstein City Palace boasts one of the finest and most imposing Baroque stairways in Vienna, which is lined with sculptures by Giovanni Giuliani and stucco work by Santino Bussi.



The Princely Collections

The Princely Collections contain major works of European art spanning five centuries and are among the most important private collections in the world. Dating back to the 17th-century, these collections are rooted in the Baroque ideal of princely patronage of the arts. For generations, the House of Liechtenstein has consistently nurtured this ideal by systematically expanding the collection through an active acquisition policy that continues to this day. This allows for the continual extension and enhancement of existing focal areas of the collection, thus maintaining the enduring attraction of the Princely Collections.

Christ in Distress

Adriaen de Vries, 1607

Adrian de Vries's remarkable and almost life-size devotional sculpture, "Christ in Distress," eloquently captures a pivotal moment in the Passion of Jesus. This poignant artwork depicts the Son of God's self-sacrifice, undertaken to redeem mankind. Christ, sitting on a rock, folding his hands, and asking for mercy, appears to be waiting for Pilate's men. The suffering to come shows clearly in his face. This sculpture derives its expressive force from the contrast between Christ's suffering features and the classical beauty of his athletic body.



Portrait of Clara Serena Rubens

Peter Paul Rubens, 1616

The Portrait of Clara Serena Rubens, painted around 1616, is one of the most touching child portraits in the history of European art. It depicts Rubens's five-year-old daughter from his marriage to Isabella Brant. Her resemblance to her mother is clear. The disarming directness with which the child looks at the viewer is not typical of contemporary portrait painting but expresses the intimate relationship between father and daughter.



The Golden Carriage of Prince Joseph Wenzel I von Liechtenstein

Nicolas Pineau, 1738

The Golden Carriage is one of the finest examples of 18th century Parisian carriage-making. Only few such vehicles survived the turmoil of the French Revolution.

It was constructed on the occasion of Prince Joseph Wenzel von Liechtenstein's appointment as imperial ambassador to the French court in 1737. The Prince commissioned the interior designer Nicolas Pineau to design five carrosses d'ambassadeur. They were the highlight of the magnificent accoutrements for his festive entrée into Paris on 21 December 1738 and at Versailles two days later. The imposing procession consisted of more than 50 coaches pulled by horses from the Princely stud at Eisgrub.



Portrait of Princess Marie Franziska von Liechtenstein at the Age of Two

Friedrich von Amerling, 1836

Prince Alois II von Liechtenstein commissioned Friedrich von Amerling to paint his children. The result was a touching series of portraits of Marie Franziska (painted in 1836), Karoline (in 1837), Sophie (in 1838) and, finally, the five-year-old hereditary prince Johann (in 1844/1845). The portrait of the slumbering two-year-old Princess Marie Franziska is, without doubt, the strongest in the series: smiling happily to herself, the sleepy child firmly clutches a doll. The viewer looks at her as if looking down on her from above, and the sunlight falling gently across her hair brings out the colour in her cheeks.



Portrait of Ladislaus von Fraunberg, Count of Haag

Hans Mielich, 1557

The Portrait of Ladislaus von Fraunberg, Count of Haag (1505–1566) by Hans Mielich is an example of the new type of full-length ruler portrait. Mielich's painting is presumably acquired by Hartmann II von Liechtenstein in 1568. According to an inventory from 1613, holds the longest tenure in the Princely Collections. Self-governing under the Kaiser, Haag ruled the county of Haag in Upper Bavaria near Wasserburg and was the last of his line.

Hans Mielich authentically portrays the count's aggressive nature and tragic fate. The count, donned in opulent Spanish attire with hand on dagger, signifies his readiness for conflict. The leopard, a gift from his brother-in-law, symbolises wealth and alludes to his Italian adventures, making the painting richly symbolic.



Sightseeing

Schönbrunn Palace

Schönbrunn Palace, the former summer residence of the imperial family, is considered one of the most beautiful Baroque palaces in Europe. Representational rooms have been furnished to replicate historic living arrangements. Emperor Franz Joseph was born here in 1830, who later married the enchanting Sissi, and reigned from 1848 to 1916.

Belvedere Palace

The Belvedere Palace is one of the best-known palaces in Vienna, with wonderful ceremonial rooms that provide an idyllic setting. Prince Eugene of Savoy, a successful general and art connoisseur, commissioned Johann Lucas von Hildebrandt to build the Belvedere Garden Palace. He used it as his summer residence as it was outside the city walls at the time. The Belvedere is not only a magnificent Baroque palace but also houses one of Austria's most valuable art collections – with key works by Gustav Klimt, Egon Schiele, and Oskar Kokoschka.

St Stephen's Cathedral

St Stephen's Cathedral and its famous Pummerin bell is known worldwide as one of Vienna's key landmarks. Leopold Museum

Café Mozart

The first coffee house on this site was opened in 1794, three years after the death of Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart. The café was a popular meeting point for writers, artists, and actors during the Biedermeier period, when it was called Café Katzmayer. In 1882, the old Baroque building was torn down and the café was re-opened in the present building, under the name Café Mozart in 1929. Graham Green worked on the screenplay of *The Third Man* here in 1947, and a scene in his classic film was shot on the premises.

Figlmüller

1905 – the year the legendary Schnitzel was born. It was that year that Johann Figlmüller opened a small wine tavern on Wollzeile, right behind St Stephen's Cathedral. Since 1436, the Hofkellerei Liechtenstein winery and ancestral seat, Wilfersdorf Palace in northeastern Austria, have remained in the Princely family's possession. Cuvées of Riesling and Grüner Veltliner are grown on the loess soil. Alongside Chardonnay and Blaufränkisch from the Leithaberg mountain range, they have gained international acclaim as wines of exquisite elegance and structure. In 1712, Ruling Prince Johann Adam I of Liechtenstein acquired the County of Vaduz, which included the renowned Herawingert vineyard. Its expressive and invigorating Pinot Noir has since become one of the most prominent Alpine Pinot Noirs.

The Lednice-Valtice Cultural Landscape is on the Unesco World Heritage list. 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
